### SUBSTITUTE:

### Enhanced Enforcement Against Water Theft and Illegal Cannabis Grows in the Antelope Valley and Illegal Cannabis Dispensaries in Unincorporated Areas

**Substitute** recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Barger and Kuehl: Direct the Chief Executive Officer, through the Legislative Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations Division, in coordination with the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management and County Counsel, to support or pursue legislation to seek the following amendments to State law: **4-VOTES** 

Provide standing to County Counsel to civilly prosecute and enjoin water theft;

Provide additional enforcement authority for water theft and/or misuse in declared drought emergencies;

Authorize County Counsel to civilly prosecute and enjoin water pollution from cannabis cultivation;

Address potential loopholes or exploitation by illegal cannabis growers, pursue increasing local government controls over illegal cannabis and unregistered hemp crops; and

Authorize an alternative means of service of process for commercial cannabis businesses when their business entity status is form unknown;

> Instruct County Counsel, in consultation with the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management, the Sheriff, Director of Regional Planning and the Agricultural Commissioner/Director of Weights and Measures, to report back to the board in 90 days with a proposed administrative nuisance abatement ordinance for unpermitted cannabis activity including illegal cannabis cultivation and dispensaries;

Instruct the Director of Regional Planning to conduct a study on a future ordinance to regulate hemp and report back to the Board in 180 days with recommendations;

Instruct the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management, in collaboration with the Sheriff and the Chief Executive Officer, to determine the type and cost of equipment that can test quantity levels of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) in cannabis, and identify any other resources needed for enhanced enforcement efforts, and report back to the Board in 30 days with the recommended next steps; and collaborate with all local, State and Federal authorities who can assist in the eradication of this environmental and quality of life nuisance, including the District Attorney, the United States Attorney, the Drug Enforcement Administration and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives; and

Direct the Chief Executive Officer to approve an appropriation adjustment shifting \$250,000 from the Fifth Supervisorial District's one-time Consumer Protection Settlement fund allocation to finance the Sheriff's Department's continued targeted enforcement and patrols of the areas impacted by the massive illegal grows and water theft in the Antelope Valley; and report back to the Board during the FY 2021-22 Supplemental Budget on potential funding sources for the County to sustain eradication of this serious environmental and quality of life nuisance. **<u>Revised</u>** recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Solis and Kuehl: Instruct the Director of Children and Family Services and the Chief Probation Officer, <u>working with the Director of Health Services</u> <u>through the Countywide Benefits Entitlement Services Team</u>, to report back to the Board in 60 days on the following:

The number of foster youth currently entitled to benefits through any Social Security Administration program including, but not limited to, Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI), Supplemental Security Income/State Supplementary Payment (SSI/SSP) and Survivors Benefits in 2019, 2020 and 2021; ...

Instruct the Director of Children and Family Services and the Chief Probation Officer, working with the Director of Health Services through the Countywide Benefits Entitlement Services Team, to ensure a no-cost, interest-bearing, bank account is created for each eligible youth in foster care to deposit social security benefits to access upon exit from foster care, this could include a CalABLE account; ... # Modernize the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority's (LAHSA's) existing Governance and Structure in Partnership with the City of Los Angeles

**<u>Revised</u>** recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Mitchell and <u>Kuehl</u>: Direct the Chief Executive Officer to collaborate with the City of Los Angeles' Chief Administrative Officer and Chief Legislative Analyst, in consultation with the Executive Director of the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority to establish a standing intergovernmental body comprised of elected officials from both the County and the City of Los Angeles (City) within <del>60</del> <u>90</u> days, to provide timely and regular input on governance of the homelessness system, with the body's role and purpose to include the following: ...

Meet at least quarterly, with greater frequency as needed, to align the vision, mission, purpose and outcomes for the County and City homelessness systems and strategy;

Develop and implement an engagement and input process for Council of Governments participation in the alignment of vision, mission, purpose and outcomes;

Clarify, define and unify language used to publicly report out numbers and outcomes in unison and in consultation with California Policy Lab or other expert jointly selected between the Chief Executive Officer and the City's Chief Administrative Officer, as a third party for data analysis; ...

Direct the Chief Executive Officer to collaborate with the City's Chief Administrative Officer and the Chief Legislative Analyst for an intergovernmental report from the Executive Director of the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority to report back to the Board in writing within 120 90 days, with recommendations and a proposed implementation plan to modernize LAHSA's organizational structure which incorporates the recommendations from LAHSA's governance report and include the following: ...

> Recommendations on Implementation of models of appointing people with lived experience to the advisory committees and workgroups overseeing LAHSA's operations and governance, including the appropriate supports for individuals to fully participate and be intentionally engaged;

Provide LAHSA with the tools needed to address organizational growth change both in terms of funding and capacity with periodic assessment of needs; and

Provide an analysis and recommendations to right-size <u>outreach</u> <u>programs inclusive of</u> LAHSA's Homeless Engagement Team tofocus on cross-jurisdiction areas such as watersheds and government-owned land as well as responding to the Los Angeles-Homeless Outreach Portal (LA-HOP) outreach requests, including shifting outreach services from LAHSA to re-locatingand housing the outreach teams with lead providers, with LAHSA to continue to oversee funding and implementation of generaloutreach plan as devised by the governing body in partnershipwith providers, redirect outreach teams to Service Planning Arealeads based on an equitable regional distribution and strengthen-LAHSA's ability to provide systems analysis and technicalsupport;-and

Include recommendations to create a Government Inquiry and Response Unit with an ombudsman for issues related to local governments which are not the City or County and a team ofgovernment liaisons to engage directly with elected offices, including Council of Governments and providers for improvedcommunication on referrals from elected offices;

Direct the Chief Executive Officer to engage the Executive Director of the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority and report back to the Board in writing within 60 days with a progress on the implementation of recommendations from the Ad Hoc Committee of Governances on operational changes intended to streamline the contracting and

> administrative activities between LAHSA, community-based service providers, the County and the City, to ensure alignment between City and County contracts where feasible, including:

<u>Improving</u> grants management system to reduce complexity and frequency of the existing procurement process; ... (21-2828)

### 78-D. Reparations for Forced Sterilizations at LAC+USC Medical Center

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Solis: Instruct the County's Legislative Advocates in Sacramento to send a letter to Governor Gavin Newsom, the California Senate President, Eleni Kounalakis, and the Assembly Speaker, Anthony Rendon, advocating for reparations for the survivors at LAC+USC Medical Center in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 budget; and direct the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with the Director of Health Services, to take the following actions:

Determine the feasibility of the Department of Health Services' ability to identify the patients impacted by the coerced sterilization at LAC+USC Medical Center between the years of 1968 and 1974 and validate said individuals; explore the feasibility of utilizing existing Health Services' funding sources to provide appropriate reparations to the survivors of the coerced sterilization at LAC+USC Medical Center between the years of 1968 and 1974 in the event the State does not provide the additional compensation through legislation or via the FY 2022-23 budget;

Engage with the community regarding appropriate reparations and methods of validation; and

Report back to the Board within 90 days with the findings. (21-2874)

### 78-E. Involving Fathers and Parental Relatives in Children's Lives

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisor Mitchell: Authorize the Director of Children and Family Services to accept \$130,000 from Mathematica Policy Research, Inc. (Mathematica) for participating in implementing the Breakthrough Series Collaborative approach and evaluation activities throughout the evaluation period, additionally, the funds will provide opportunities for ongoing father engagement trainings and the development of media and promotional items; execute a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Department of Children and Family Services and Mathematica to conduct a 21-month descriptive evaluation of strategies and approaches to improving fathers and paternal relative engagement being implemented by child welfare agencies who participated in the pilot study, effective upon execution by all parties for a period of 21 months; amend the MOU for necessary changes to the terms and conditions, as needed; and terminate the MOU for convenience or default.
